

Power Up! Minute Paper

The quest to up your teaching and learning game provides an opportunity to Power-Up your tech skills. To accept this challenge, use the Minute Paper activity in synchronous/asynchronous courses or as an online component of onsite courses. Create a Form

Display a QR code or link a Tiny URL for learners to answer a minute paper using a Google Form with the prompt and allow participants to write their paragraph response on the form. A benefit to you is that the responses show up in a spreadsheet and are easily sorted.

Padlet

Use padlet.com for learners to post anonymous answers as virtual sticky notes.

Kahoot!

Most learners are familiar with Kahoot! Use this online tool to collect anonymous "Survey" responses from learners as a minute paper.

Formative

Use the web tool Formative.com to collect Minute Papers from learners. One benefit of using this web tool is learners can express their understanding in multiple formats, including drawing in response to the minute paper to demonstrate their understanding.

Socrative

Allow learners to answer questions from the comfort of their device in synchronous or asynchronous sessions. You can easily collate the responses to provide feedback.

Answer Garden

Use Answer Garden to collect anonymous responses. Participants will have to be succinct in their responses.

The One Minute Thread

Kevin Kelly created an asynchronous adaptation of the Minute Paper. Determine a question to pose in your asynchronous course. In your discussion forum, create a single thread or discussion topic for your question, including clear instructions that participants should NOT start a new thread. This keeps the forum organized. Instruct learners to read the prompt, think about it for one minute, and then write a 1 to 3 sentence response. You can reply to some posts, based on the quality of their response.
